After a short walk from the parking lot sponsored by Ray Simas, Branch Manager at San Diego National Bank, guests were serenaded by the

With champagne flutes in hand, guests entered the cocktail reception and silent auction on the lower deck. Debbie Hatz, auction chair, filled the beautiful hall with a display of items from A (Admissions to activities, attractions and adventures) to Z (Zed Electric donated two hours of electrical work). Celebrity items such as CDs and DVDs of Frankie Laine, and autographed first editions of Joseph Wambaugh's latest book brought multiple bids. With over 150 items to choose from, there was something for everybody. There was spirited bidding during the live auction as well – especially for Dee and Peter Van Horne's fabulous day cruise on their yacht. Thanks to all the generous bidders and the businesses and people who donated their items to the auction, over \$17,000 was raised for PLA activities – a new record!

Dwight Harrington's crew had video cameras off the stern capturing views that they projected onto three huge screens.

Undergrounding Utilities: Be in the know!

I got a notice stating that my street will be undergrounded soon. Where can I get more information? You can get schedule updates at http://www.sandiego.gov/undergrounding/. The web site also provides detailed information about the process of undergrounding and what you can expect.

Will this cost anything? In most cases, no. It is the legal responsibility of the property owner to underground from the street to your house or business beginning at the property line. However, the utility companies will perform this work at no cost to you as long as you sign an agreement to allow utility companies on to your property.

How long does it take? From the time you receive notice that the Council has created an Underground Utility District, there will be a period of 12 to 18 months of design. You may see engineers working from time to time on your street. After construction begins, most projects are completed in 18 to 24 months.

How were the areas that are now being undergrounded selected? The City Council determines which areas in the city will be undergrounded. A Master Plan is designed and approved no later than June 30 of each year.

What if I want to accelerate when my street will be undergrounded? A cost share program allows home owners to accelerate the undergrounding schedule. All cost sharing work is at the sole discretion of each individual Council member. OBCDC Entryway Projects Set to Go!

Many thanks to the County, and particularly Supervisor Greg Cox for approving a grant for the Nimitz and Sunset Cliffs Boulevard Entryway Median Landscaping Project. The \$11,300 grant will fund landscaping and irrigation materials, equipment and supplies. OBCDC needs an additional \$10,000 to complete the project.

Thanks go out to the Point Loma Rotary Club for sending nearly two dozen volunteers to help Ocean Beach CDC in a weed and debris removal clean up on the last Saturday of April, as part of the Rotarians at Work Day.

Approximately three tons of weeds and debris were removed along Sunset Cliffs Boulevard at Robb Field.

Finally, the Gateway Park and Pathways Project of OBCDC is offering reservations for engraved tiles and bricks to be placed upon the walls along the pathway through the park. Be sure and reserve your Tile or Brick to include your legacy message. Funds from the donations sponsoring the 12x12 inch tiles and the 4x8 inch bricks will be used to match other contributions and grants to begin Phase I construction.

Newsrack Ordinance Editorial

The character of our communities is greatly defined by what we see when we walk down the street. If you have strolled down the sidewalk recently, especially in our beach communities and downtown, you have probably noticed the proliferation of old and broken newsracks. These fixtures can block the sidewalks, reduce walkability, and often stand empty and unused, serving only as magnets for graffiti.

For all these reasons, I was proud to support the newly-crafted Newsrack Ordinance, which the City Council unanimously adopted on January 30, 2007. As a result of the amended Newsrack Ordinance, walking down our sidewalks will be a more pleasurable experience without the unsightly and sometimes seamy newsracks that compete for space and attention. While no one wants to banish newsracks altogether, these new regulations acknowledge that long rows of unmaintained newsracks are a public nuisance.

The amended Newsrack Ordinance accomplishes two things: it imposes additional physical and location standards for newsracks and sets up new permit requirements. The problem in the past has been an inability to discern the identities of the owners of newsracks. This has resulted in a lack of accountability for maintenance and appearance. The new permit requirements allow the City to readily identify newsrack owners, while the annual permit fee will offset expenses associated with pro-active enforcement. Any newsracks that do not have a permit, are deteriorated, or are not properly located can now be removed.

Crafting this ordinance was no simple matter; it required years of collaboration between the City, local businesses, and publishers and distributors. I am grateful to the Point Loma Association and the Gaslamp Quarter Association for championing this issue for so many years. June 9th is the deadline for newsrack owners to conform to these new requirements. I am looking forward to marshalling a fleet of trucks to remove unlicensed and poorly maintained newsracks and then proudly reclaiming our sidewalks.

Who We Are

Point Loma Association was organized in 1961. Originally called "Point Loma Village Beautiful," we were primarily concerned with the aesthetics of the Village.
