Welcome Tom Workman

... the new Superintendent of Cabrillo National Park. Superintendent Workman arrived here from Kalaupapa National Historical Park on the Hawaiian island of Molokai, where he served as Superintendent for over six years.

Workman was born in Riverside, California, and stayed there after high school, when his parents moved to San Diego. He eventually graduated from Northern Arizona University, and remained in Arizona to begin his career as a ranger at Glen Canyon National Recreation Area. From there, he went to Grand Canyon National Park, then to American Memorial Park in the Northern Mariana Islands, Saipan. He also served as Chief Ranger at Canyon de Chelly National Monument on Navajo Tribal Trust Land.

Workman lives here in Point Loma, where he can be close to his father – and to the residents and visitors he hopes to educate about protecting our natural resources, promoting native species and eradicating invasive species. Workman continues to work with the Navy, who has allowed an area for the park's native plant nursery on the Navy Base. He hopes to make it open to the public and have volunteers help transplant native species to areas of the park overtaken by non-native species and distribute seeds for native species.

The park is working closely with the SD Maritime Museum in their quest to replicate the ship *San Salvador* - Juan Cabrillo's ship. Planning for the annual Cabrillo Festival is also underway, as well as enhancing the parking area by the tide pools to allow for a turn-around, and installing a vault toilet for visitors.



Beautification update

Newsracks: Councilman Faulconer's office is investigating the use of two newsrack corrals in front of the Post Office - one with coin slots and the other for free publications. The corrals

will be dark green and contain no ads.

Utility Boxes: There are four boxes at the intersection of West Point Loma and Nimitz that have needed attention for some time. One is west of the intersection on West Point Loma, and the other three are on the pork chop with the bright blue and orange "poppy box."

The Utility Box Committee held a contest at Point Loma High School to solicit designs – and painters for two of the boxes. Art student Priscilla Ortiz won the honor of painting her own design on the pork chop box, and painting Correia student Sierra Swann's design on the other box. She is also receiving a cash award for her efforts. Priscilla completed Sierra's box – a rendering of Sierra's interpretation of what Point Loma looked like before us humans moved in.



Look for Priscilla's beautiful sunset design on the pork chop by early April.

Many thanks to Beverly Brady, a member of the Point Loma Artists, for providing expert advice to Priscilla. Beverly has already painted two boxes in

Point Loma, and has begun her Birds of Paradise design on the pork chop.

Finally, the Utility Box Committee is choosing three locations in the Village for the next project, and artist and PLA member Ann Walker is excited about painting two boxes in front of Point Loma Park with a Point Loma Summer Concerts theme.

An interesting note as you read Cecilia Carrick's graffiti report: when a utility box is painted, it is less likely to be tagged. Painting utility boxes beautifies the community in many ways.

Al's Garage at Rosecrans/Talbot: Dene Oliver and Jim and Leslie Reynolds have purchased this site. Their intent is to build retail and office space on the site with construction beginning as early as seven months from now.

Roses and Radishes: Three roses! To Point Break Cafe for its flower boxes, the Elegant Truffles signage and Dorothea Laub's permanent PLA display in the Point Loma Branch Library. Look for the case across from the elevator.

Ganging up on graffiti

There is a serious problem developing in our neighborhood. Our beloved Point Loma is being vandalized by a subculture of kids whose goal is to be noticed through graffiti. Graffiti vandalism is a crime and it hurts our neighborhood. There is much data supporting the conclusion that the presence of graffiti creates a perception of diminished quality of services and declining property values. Economists and social scientists refer to this as the "broken window theory" of blight and deterioration.

The city of San Diego is currently spending more than a million dollars a year solely on graffiti abatement. This siphons tax dollars from other needed services and does not begin to account for personal funds currently being spent by our local businesses and homeowners on keeping their walls and signs clean or replacing their etched glass windows.

Graffiti comes in many shapes and forms including etching of glass, slap tags and spray painting, but it is all malicious damage to private and public property. Graffiti is usually performed by at risk youth, typically with low self esteem. Their goal is to achieve what this subculture refers to as "fame." It promotes crime even before any graffiti is performed by advocating stealing or "racking" the paint. There are no redeeming features to this defacing activity, and a laissez-faire attitude will ultimately be harmful to all of us.

If you witness someone actively committing an act of graffiti, call 9-1-1. Be a good witness (personal features, license plates), but do not confront a graffiti vandal. They may carry a weapon and often have look-outs you may not see. To report graffiti, call the Graffiti Control Hotline at (619) 525-8522. Provide details on the location, cross street and graffiti description. You can also go to www.sandiego.gov/graffiti/.

If you would like to personally help, adopt a sign, or a structure near your home or business. Good products like Krud Kutter Graffiti Remover Spray (available at Frazee) will remove much of the marker blight. A light rub with very fine steel wool (0000) and paper towel makes it quick. Please DO NOT rub or paint the front of street signs. It alters their reflective nature, making it a hazard, especially at night. An entryway to be proud of

For many years, the onramp to Famosa Blvd. from Nimitz has been covered in weeds and overgrown brush - making it a perfect spot for trash and homeless encampments.



The Point Loma Association has been working for many years to get the area cleaned up and planted, but there was a problem: no water! With the persistence of PLA Board member Celeste Trepte and help

from Matt Awbry of Councilman Kevin Faulconer's office, the PLA tapped into a water source at the base of the Famosa bridge. Then, After some of the brush was already hauled away Occidental Landscaping

were contracted to add over 30 feet of copper piping to the existing pipe running along the bridge. That piping was connected to an irrigation system installed by Moises Sanchez of Total Green Landscape. Alpha Project personnel, along with City of San Diego Environmental Services, helped remove trash and weeds.

On February 26, it was time to plant trees. Urban Corps of San Diego delivered the trees – and the workers – and planted 11 Canary Island Pines and five Jacarandas. Urban Corps has a tree planting program funded by San Diego Gas & Electric. SDG&E provides funds for trees, labor, and education programs. Members of the PLA "Mean Green Team," Moises Sanchez, Urban Forester Drew Potoki, Urban Corps, and Matt Awbry of Councilman Kevin Faulconer's office were on hand to watch the first tree go in. Since then, the fence has been repaired by the City Streets Department and shrubs and bougainvillea have been planted.

Water remains an issue for the rest of the onramp, but the PLA came up with a beautiful solution. Michael Buckner, a renowned designer specializing in drought tolerant gardens, will plant an "artscape" representing a sunset. He plans to build three semi-eliptic planting mounds with the lowest, mid-size, and largest lined up from north to south, "leading the eye to a higher plane as you enter Point Loma." Plants include Sticks on Fire with red, yellow and orange foliage; Variegated Elephant Bush; and

red-leafed and red-blooming aloes. Buckner will also use round river rock to create ribbonlike lines – 15 tons worth.

After an initial watering period (performed by PLA), the succulent garden will rarely, if ever, need extra water, according to Buckner. Many thanks to Celeste Trepte, Jodie Bruhn, Karen Davis, and other members of the Beautification Committee for not giving up! Kevin Faulconer and Matt Awbry also deserve special thanks for their coordination efforts with various City and private departments to help complete the project.

Point Loma history uncovered

In the Winter 2005 edition of the PLA newsletter, there was a brief item about a mystery structure at the "V" where Santa Barbara and Hill Streets intersect. It was covered with ivy, and of particular interest to Mike Ryan, who lives across the street. The article asked, "Is it a sign, or a sign?"

The house where it sits has since been purchased by long-time Point Loma residents Daniel and Augustina Noe, who have cleared out much of the shrubbery around the home – including the ivy covering the structure.



What emerged is a circa early 1900s structure that they think served as the other half of an archway stretching across Santa Barbara Avenue.

According to neighborhood lore, the other half was taken out by a drunk driver years ago.

Carrie Lynn Noe, daughter of the homeowners, grew up down the street on Catalina Avenue. She remembers a man sitting on the monument every day. "I remember it being very tall," she said.

The structure, made of brick and plaster, is showing its years. The

plaster is cracked, and the corner, as you can see in the picture, perhaps fell victim to another wayward driver. The Noe family would like to restore it, but they want to check with the Historical Society before they proceed. "We don't want to destroy something that belongs to the community," said Noe. "We want to preserve its authenticity." Does this structure look familiar to you? Fresh & Easy/Peet's Coffee

Neighbors lamenting the loss of grocery shopping options south of Nimitz are anxiously awaiting the new grocery store and coffee shop, which are slated to open some time in May. Look for renderings of Phase II of the "Point Loma Marketplace" at the Annual Dinner. It consists of Buildings B, C and D. Building B will be located at the corner of Catalina and Talbot and will house a single user (financial tenant) or three separate users. There will also be a monument wall on the corner of Talbot and Catalina listing the tenants. Building C will be located at the site of the current three-story building. Building D will replace the one-story building on Cañon and Catalina. It will remain a one-story building designed for office or dental use. Anticipated completion? Two years.

The PLA and Councilman Faulconer's Office is working with the developer to replace the plastic bus bench in front of the store with a PLA bench.

NTC Park Phase II

Councilman Kevin Faulconer announced that the City received funds to begin Phase II of NTC Park – making all 46 acres of the park open to the public. The park will have a restroom, play structure, and more open space. The projected opening date is Summer of 2009.

Fleet Week

In a community accustomed to seeing sailboats navigate around bouys, airplanes flying around huge inflatable pylons draws a double-take. On May 3-4, the Red Bull Air Race kicks off this year's Fleet Week, the largest event honoring the military in the United States. The race, promoted by the San Diego International Sports Council, pits 14 of the world's best pilots in lightweight race planes against each other on a 1.5 course on San Diego Bay.

The Air Race follows the ever-popular Sea & Air Parade at 11:00, when the U.S. Navy parades down The Big Bay. The best viewing will be from Shelter Island, Harbor Island, the Cruise Ship Terminal, Broadway Pier and the lawn area next to the Fish Market Restaurant.
