

Dorothea Laub

A Profile

owerhouse. Do-er. Opinionated. Stunning. These words aptly describe this year's Lighthouse Award recipient, Dorothea Laub.

Dorothea has a lengthy history of service on



After a stint with the Peninsula Planning Board, Dorothea got involved with the PLA in 1979. "The emphasis was more on beautification back then," she said. "We were not politically involved. ... We got rid of billboards and the 'Booby Trap.' ... We tried to get rid of Les Girls, but we lost that battle." (Dorothea explained that the "Booby Trap" was a strip club located at the current La Scala location.)

During that time, the PLA also fought the Port's proposal to extend Anchorage Lane into what is currently the dirt path across from the San Diego Yacht Club. "They wanted to pave it and allow motorized vehicles," she said. The Port was also threatening to remove all seven docks along the path. "The PLA was the main force in saving the docks and keeping the path along the beach."

Dorothea also remembered what she called "one of PLA's greatest success stories: saving Dana Jr. High. "If it had not been for the hundreds of hours of effort, we would not have this gem of a school today," she said.

During her nine-year tenure on the board, Dorothea was the Annual Dinner Chair for six or seven of those years. "It was simpler then," she said. "We didn't have live and silent auctions. You came in, sat down, and visited with friends. We had Mayor O'Conner and Ernie Hahn as guest speakers." She continued, "Norm Magneson, Mac Lovett, Dick Lareau, Bill Herrin, Cammie Peter, Alnora Bishop, Kathy Hattox were some of the members on the PLA board at that time and they still support PLA today. Five of these former board members were at the dinner this year."

When Dorothea returned to the PLA Board two years ago, she took up where she left off, becoming involved in last year's dinner, and serving as the dinner chair this year. Things have changed. "Now there is a lot of pressure to raise money to fund our many projects."

And the PLA is different – and in Dorothea's opinion – better. "PLA is a better organization today because we have moved beyond flowers and trees," she said. "We need new members. ... I'm excited about the new board members – they're young, and they're go-getters."

Asked about receiving the Lighthouse Award, Dorothea said, "It was totally unexpected. I was delighted; thrilled. ... I didn't even think to ask who would get it: I was more concerned about the dinner."

Patti Adams brought the award to her the day after the dinner. "Patti had it in a bag," she said. "I thought it was food – she's always feeding me." When Patti showed her the award, "We cried," said Dorothea. "We both just sat there and cried."

Beautification update

ou may have noticed the latest BIG beautification project undertaken by the Mean Green Team – the Nimitz Triangle, located where Nimitz and Sunset Cliffs Boulevard intersect. The area has been plagued by weeds – and owners of off-road vehicles who regularly run over sprinkler heads.

This area is also named "Ed's Triangle" due to Ed Streicher's years of dedication (pictured here). Ed is out there on a regular basis repairing irrigation

breaks and "keeping it in some semblance of order,"
according to Karen Davis. The Mean Green Team has
decided to add some bodies to Ed's "one man show"
and have dedicated five work days to pulling weeds,
picking up trash, repositioning old telephone poles to
deter the off-roaders, and fixing broken irrigation
pipes. The Urban Corps helped out by spreading two
truckloads of wood chips on the perimeter. Atlas Trees
has agreed to bring in two more loads of wood chips.

The area was originally part of the OB Community Development Corporation's project. Karen Davis hopes to work with the OBCDC to revise the design. "We want it to be attractive," she said. "We're not trying to make it a fancy area. We want to put in natives that don't require water or trimming. Our goal is to keep it under control."

Other Beautification news

Rosecrans Newsracks At the June PLA meeting, Matt Awbrey discussed the removal of newsracks along Rosecrans – namely, in front of the Winchell's Donut corner.

The Learning Annex box is going – or gone, as of this printing, as well as the Navy Compass box. As The Learning Annex is out of business, the boxes will begin to disappear around the city. "We [hope to] start working our way down Rosecrans, toward the Village," said Ron Brooks. "We will target the noncompliant and uncertified news bins from Talbot to Harbor." The committee is very pleased with the new Village Post Office corral and looks forward to seeing it filled with publications.

Graffiti Strike Force The amount of graffiti seems to be decreasing in the Point Loma area. Cecilia Carrick reported that, as a result of the PLA's and other efforts to document local graffiti, police arrested two young men. Perhaps the arrest and the decrease in graffiti are related! The Graffiti Strike Force removed graffiti on the Nimitz wall, and is keeping an eye on the old Vons building, where the fence is helping reduce graffiti.

Tennyson Triangle Dr. Gary Rose has proposed planting Canary Island Pine trees on the Tennyson Triangle in a location that would shield the adjacent house. He will purchase the trees and hire Moises Sanchez with Total Green Landscape to plant them.

Nimitz/Poe Carolyn Kutzke provided a work crew to clean up this area and put down a layer of mulch spread. The area will soon be planted with drought-tolerant landscaping.

Money! The Beautification Committee recently received \$5000 from a generous but anonymous donor, plus another \$500 from Katheryn Rhodes and \$50 from the centerpiece that Karen and Jodie sold at the dinner. Ideas for using the funds quickly centered on a plan to plant bougainvillea and succulents on the Catalina exit ramp, creating "book ends" for the Nimitz bridge.

is executive leadership. "I want to create a chairman's committee composed of the two previous chairs, and the current and vice chair. This will create continuity and help the vice chair get connected," he said.

He also wants to focus on PLA's growing beautification budget, which consumes half of the overall budget. He would like to make it self sufficient by setting up a special, lasting fund to pay for projects.

And he's concerned about membership. "We need to reach outside the board to get more members. We need to get retired people with time and energy to help with membership."

He also wants to get the word out about what PLA does. "Very few people under 60 know about the PLA," he said. "I was impressed with Noah's video [at the dinner] because he focused on all the things the PLA has done in the past. We need to communicate what we do — what we've done, what we're doing, and where we're going. We need a PR/Marketing committee."

He also wants the PLA to reach out to the community. "We need to know what the community wants us to do," he said. "Do they want us to just continue with concerts and beautification, or something else?"

Whatever it is, Tony knows that PLA can get it done. "The PLA has the influence to make a difference where it counts," he said. "We have the ear of City Hall – I mean, we have representatives from the Council, Mayor's Office, and Assembly at our Board meetings!"

Tony also sees potential in reaching out to a community within our community: the Portuguese community. "We need to get the PLA involved in the 100th anniversary of the Festa," he said. "It's going to be HUGE. I'd like to see the Mean Green Team marching in the Festa parade. The Portuguese community doesn't know what the PLA does."

When asked about his other occupation as a comedian, he said, "I'm terrible at golf. I do stand up to relax. I've been doing it since I was 18 – professionally since 1995."

Somehow, he does five-six shows a week. And, because he's not busy enough, he set up Comedy Inc., which does comedy shows for charities, schools, corporate events, and fundraisers.

He also squeezes in his role as "Tony the Banker" on a talk radio business show with Rusty Nails and Bob Sullivan during the week. The show plays on over 100 stations around the country. It's broadcast in San Diego on KCEO am 1000.

And – surprise? He's writing a book. It's based on the stories he's told his grandchildren about the Knights of Pillsbury, a group of older men in a secret society who perform good works. It's a comedy, of course.
