In Memoriam: Celeste Trepte

This issue is dedicated to one of the original Point Loma Village Beautiful founders, Celeste Trepte, who left an indelible mark on our beautiful community. (Point Loma Village Beautiful became the Point Loma Association in 1989.)

In 1953, Celeste had married Gene Trepte and moved to Point Loma from La Canada-Flintridge. She was impressed with the views from Point Loma—but not the views on the streets of the Village. “It was so ugly,” said Celeste. “We had the most beautiful view in the world, and no one was doing anything [about the Village].” At the time, the Village (Rosecrans Street between Talbot and Nimitz) was crowded with billboards, gas stations, and looming power lines.

In 1961, Celeste and a group of concerned neighbors formed Point Loma Village Beautiful and got to work. When I was researching the 50-year history of the PLA, I found a 1964 San Diego Magazine article in which Celeste said, “We have made up our minds that to make Point Loma beautiful will be just a long, slow, time-consuming thing.”

By 1972, hundreds of trees had replaced over 100 power poles. Celeste served numerous terms on the board and wrote the newsletter (which she called the “life-blood of this group”), leaving the board only for a short while when she had three daughters getting married and grandchildren on the way soon after.

In 2011, Celeste received the Lighthouse Award, PLA’s highest honor, for the Point Loma entryway project, which involved a complicated scheme to get water over the Nimitz Bridge in order to landscape the Famosa ramp with trees and bushes. When asked in a 2011 article about the PLA’s greatest accomplishments, Celeste didn’t hesitate. “Getting power lines off Rosecrans, trees in the center of Nimitz, the plantings done in the Village—pork chops—all the stuff that the Green Team does.”

Whenever Celeste called me—which was usually about suggestions for newsletter items—my husband Dave joked that “the boss was calling.”



Kay North: “I remember sitting around the table—everyone after a busy day of family, business, and all the demands of young lives, dreadful lighting in the room making us all look even more tired and ghastly, but all of us showing up to contribute to the effort to make our neighborhood as beautiful as it deserved to be! Celeste was unwavering and stalwart. It COULD be done. Those appalling bill boards COULD go away. She had no doubt. Her artistic eye and her excellent taste were only a part of it. Dedication and tenacity. Again, SHE HAD NO DOUBT! I am so proud of her, all she inspired, and so painfully aware of all that still needs doing.”

Robert Jackson: “When I was a kid, the Board had their meeting down at Great American Bank (Cañon and Rosecrans where Sweetaly is). I had my coloring book and crayons. I was told to “stay quiet” by my mom, and Celeste would help lighten the mood with a chuckle. Then in 1995, I got involved with the Beautification Committee and then the Board. Celeste would call me, and want me to find out who owned a certain piece of property. That seemed to be my role for a while. With the information I provided, Celeste could approach a situation via a letter. One time, she thought a certain business on Rosecrans was a front for an illegal activity. Celeste asked me to look into it and notify the Police. Well, that didn’t get very far!

“What really impresses me about Celeste is her long term dedication to the PLA. We all miss her.”

The week before she died, she had called to tell me that she hadn't received her newsletter. I called back and assured her it was on its way.

Like many of you, I attended her lovely memorial service, which highlighted her deep faith in God and commitment to family. Here, I want to shine a light on her deep faith and commitment to our community. Many thanks to contributors Kay North, Robert Jackson, Klonie Kunzel (Kay and Klonie are also PLVB founders), Patti Adams, Karen Davis, Jodie Bruhn, and County Supervisor Greg Cox for their remembrances of Celeste.

Patti Adams: "I served two, four-year terms on the board. Knowing Celeste motivated me to stay involved through the Membership Committee, and the PLA booth at the Farmer's Market. That's because from the moment of Point Loma Beautiful's inception, Celeste worked tirelessly year after year — for no recognition — just to make our community a better place. She had no agenda — no expectation of personal gain; she did it for the love of her adopted community.

"Celeste also personally donated to many PLA projects including Celestial Gardens, the Silver Gate slope, and the Nimitz median — again without want of recognition.

"Month after month, Celeste attended Beautification meetings — and took on the thankless job of Code Compliance, a job no one wanted. She'd have a conversation with a rogue business owner or homeowner, and things miraculously happened. Celeste noticed that the medians adjacent to the airport were looking poor, so she contacted the Airport Authority and — things changed. A lot of people notice things and complain; it takes a special person to notice and take action.

"Celeste's impeccable style was a reflection of her expectations for the community. She held strong opinions and beliefs about what the PLA should be doing, but was always gracious when the majority decided differently.

"Even though she spent summers away from Point Loma in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, she still stayed in touch and involved. She didn't take up email for the longest time so there were many faxes sent and received. Celeste set such a great example and we all have much to learn from her."

County Supervisor Greg Cox: On January 28, 2014, Supervisor Cox adjourned the Country Supervisors meeting in honor of Celeste. Here's part of his dedicatory text:

"In 2008, [Celeste] received the Association's Grand Beautification Award for her years of service, an award that I was honored to personally present to her.

"Celeste Trepte left an indelible and beautiful impression on Point Loma and she will be fondly remembered for her many contributions to improve her community."

Karen Davis and Jodie Bruhn: "Celeste was a key driver in many projects, but the "Celestial Garden," in our view, was a crowning achievement. If you go east on Nimitz Blvd. and pass by the Catalina offramp, you cannot miss the beautiful array of succulents with great hills of 'sticks of fire' in the middle. Celeste had passed this previously uncared for area so many times in her life, and decided to do something about

it. She drove this project from start to finish and ensured its completion by heavily funding it. Utilizing a succulent plant expert, she envisioned and delivered a beautiful plant display as a gift to all who pass by. She especially wanted to demonstrate the beauty and potential of a garden that, once established, would require no water. We on the Mean Green Team dubbed it the “Celestial Garden” because we all knew that without her dream and tenacious nature, it would not be the beauty it is today.”

Klonie Kunzel: “We returned to San Diego in 1960 after three years in Berkeley (Fritz’s law school years)...and had barely unpacked our belongings, when we met Celeste...through our long time college friends, Kay North and Don Hartley...”

“Celeste had married Gene a few years before, and had begun their life in Point Loma. She was used to the picturesque community of La Canada and was a bit distressed by the Point Loma of the early 60’s....No trees along Rosecrans, many billboards, strip clubs...but, she could see the potential!

“We began meeting at the Quarter Deck (how many of you remember that...!!)...then Don Hartley’s office, across Rosecrans...where Red’s is now....We were all young, idealistic and anxious to create a more attractive place to call home.

“Celeste was determined.....hard working....and, in her quiet way...pushed us all to join in her effort.

“In my mind, the word that best describes Celeste is....perfection....Never a hair out of place, perfectly dressed for the occasion, wonderful wife and mother...and so dedicated to making Point Loma the wonderful place it’s becoming....Primarily thanks to her!!”

Earth’s Choice and Redz

How does purchasing a necklace or piece of art in Point Loma impact a woman in Nicaragua? Uganda? Guatemala? Karen Cebreros, green coffee trader, organic coffee pioneer, and owner of the soon-to-be-open Earth’s Choice at 1021 Rosecrans (formerly Fuerza Pilates), will donate proceeds from sales toward creating micro-credit unions for women in the coffee trade. The arts and crafts are created by Latin American women-in-coffee, a term used to describe women in the trade.

As a long-time coffee trader, Karen has seen too much poverty among women in the coffee trade. “I’ve always wanted to help people,” said Karen.

“If a woman can escape poverty by owning her own business, she can also escape domestic violence, and get her children to school.”



The front of her store will be the retail operation; in the back, Karen will continue her role as CEO of one of her for-profit businesses, Coffee Cares, which provides software for corporations to track their contributions to chosen nonprofits.

For Karen, Coffee Cares is a great means to an end – supporting a cause dear to her. Karen co-founded International Women’s Coffee Alliance in 2003, an organization with the stated mission: “Empower women in the international coffee community to achieve meaningful and sustainable lives; and to encourage and recognize the participation of women in all aspects of the coffee industry.” The IWCA helps women access resources such as micro loans and collaboration with other women-in-coffee. Karen also owns Women of Coffee, which provides micro-loans funded by shares in the company.

Her neighbor, Deborah Powers, the new owner of Redz Eatery & Arts (formerly Reds), shares Karen’s vision for helping women-in-coffee. She and Karen are

developing the label, Sirens Coffee Company, which will be served at Redz. Additionally, Deborah has a new menu featuring breakfast, lunch, and dinner, plus wines from all over the world. The space will also feature an art gallery as well as live music every Sunday at 6:00 p.m. "We are a Bohemian, wi-fi cafe," said Deborah.

With the swearing in of Kevin Faulconer as San Diego's new mayor, a vacancy was created in the Council District Two office. Because less than a year remains in the term of office, the City Council will appoint a person to fill the vacancy. 19 residents from District Two have applied for the position and it is anticipated the City Council will appoint the next councilmember on April 14 or 15, 2014. The individual selected will serve until December 8, 2014.

Staff members Chet Barfield, Tracy Cambre, Nicole Capretz and Steve Hadley join chief of staff Thyme Curtis in the Council District Two office. These individuals focus on addressing the needs and concerns of the Point Loma, Ocean Beach, Pacific Beach, Mission Beach, Linda Vista, Bay Park, Bay Ho, Morena, Midway and North Bay residents, and attending the District's 19 monthly community meetings.

In addition to their constituent case work, the staff participates in weekly neighborhood projects throughout Council District Two. They recently helped out in the Ocean Beach Entryway garden, and cleaned up debris adjacent to the Rose Creek Canyon.

Thinking big, thinking beautiful... another Point Loma Association project

Nimitz Boulevard, the grand entryway into relatively undiscovered Point Loma and Ocean Beach, is screaming for a visionary re-do. This 2.3 mile north south byway connects the ocean basin of the San Diego River to the San Diego Bay. It also connects schools and residential neighborhoods with scenic miles of already existing bicycle paths, several parks, tennis courts and stunning water fronts. And yet today, long barren medians are lined by rutted asphalt and concrete splashed with efforts to cover past graffiti, which alternates with faded signage and corridors of unkempt greenery and homeless litter.

The Point Loma Association envisions Nimitz Boulevard as big and beautiful. A transformative gateway enticing hundreds of thousands of north south bound commuters, school children and tourists to safely bike, walk and drive throughout PL. This main connector deserves protected Class I bike lanes, attractive median plantings, traffic calming features and lastly a bridge, essential to connecting southern residential neighborhoods with our parks and play grounds.

The PLA has embarked on a mission of beautifying Nimitz, one project at a time. In 1999, the PLA started the first phase by planting pines and bougainvilleas along a segment between the bridges. In 2011, the PLA planted drought resistant, colorful succulents, pines and bougainvilleas on the off and on ramps to Catalina Blvd. Recently, the PLA transformed a new segment of Nimitz near West Pt. Loma Blvd with colorful succulents, rocks and, in the future, public art.

The Point Loma Association represents a hard working, committed group of volunteers who have been helping make PL /OB better and more beautiful for over 52 years. From bringing down billboards, supporting free concerts at the park and painting utility boxes to discourage graffiti, the Nimitz Boulevard Enhancement project is only one of our many endeavors.

The first phase of the Nimitz Grand Entryway project is complete! These photos tell a great story of what can be done with a LOT of volunteer time, generous donations, and sheer grit.
